- The Queen Contest will be held on Sunday, August 23, 2020 for the purpose of selecting the Kiowa County Fair & Rodeo Queen, Junior Princess, and Tiny Tot Princess, for the following year.
- Must be a Kiowa County Resident
- Age requirements : Queen 15-23 (single),: Junior Princess 9-14; Tiny Tot Princess 5-8. Age is determined as of the date of the contest.
- Notice of the contest will be published two weeks prior to the contest.
- Contest will be conducted by person appointed by the Kiowa County Fair Board and parents or care givers of current royalty with appointee as chairperson.
- Approved patterns will be used for the horsemanship contest and will be 50% of score, poise and personality 25%, and appearance 25%. A contestant must score at least 60 % of the possible points in each category (Horsemanship, Poise and Personality, and Appearance) to qualify for Queen. Proper fitting tack will be included in the appearance section.
- Patterns for Horsemanship will be sent to interested persons prior to contest by calling the Royalty Coordinator.
- Proper Royalty attire, including long pants, long sleeved shirt, western hat, belt, and boots are required. Chaps are optional.
- Judge's notes will be available after contest WITHOUT scores. Score sheets will be kept confidential until crowning of Royalty on Saturday of the Kiowa County Fair and Rodeo. Judge's decisions are final. Any undue criticism, by any person associated with the contestant will result in disqualification of said contestant.
- The Queen and her attendants will be crowned at the Rodeo on Saturday after all the other dignitaries are announced (as not to confuse them with the current Royalty). Sash, flowers, and Royalty Buckles will be presented at this time.
- The new Queen and attendants reign will begin October 1 and continue through September 30 the next year. Royalty may serve consecutive years in the same position, at the discretion of the Kiowa County Fair Board.
- The Junior Princess and Tiny Tot Princess are required to attend the Kiowa County Fair & Rodeo and compete in Kiowa County Fun Day at the Fair.
- The Queen is required to attend four (4) rodeos during her reign, which includes the Kiowa County Fair & Rodeo and compete in Kiowa County Fun Day at the Fair .
- Mileage will be paid as follows: Queen - \$500.00; Junior Princess - \$250.00; Tiny Tot Princess - \$150.00. This will be paid upon reporting to the Kiowa County Fair Board at their October meeting.

Food Auction

All 4-H Projects shown at Exhibit Day must be exhibited at the Kiowa County Fair to receive premium money and project completion. Projects must be in place by 9:00 a.m. on Thursday September 10, 2020.

Exhibit day classes are listed in this section. For exhibit requirements, the Colorado State Fair Syllabus will be used. 4-H Leaders and the Extension Office will have the information you need. You can also find the Syllabus online at:

- Judging will include evaluation of the exhibit and an interview with the exhibitor. Each member will bring their exhibit to the judge to be judged according to the interview schedule. Those who are not present for the interview will not be eligible for awards or premium money. Exception may be made only by advance written request from the exhibitor and parent in case of hardship.
- All ribbon premiums will be paid in Eads Shopping Bucks and paid out at the conclusion of the Kiowa County Fair.
- Premiums and ribbon for completed projects will be awarded using a modified American/Danish system, as it follows the Colorado State Fair system. A judge may award more than one Blue/ 1st ribbon if the quality of project requires; however, only the top entry per class may be deemed eligible for State Fair. If the top exhibit is awarded a red/2nd ribbon, it is eligible for State Fair only on conditions established by the judge and Extension Agent.
- The 4-H Council will seek sponsorship of awards for each division as determined by the Extension Office. To be eligible for an award, a project must have received first place AND Project Champion. A Reserve Champion ribbon will be given as well, but they will not receive an award.
- All exhibits must be in place by 10:00 a.m. on exhibit day and cannot be removed until after the Food Auction that evening.
- An Awards program will be held to recognize winners following the evenings Fashion Revue.
- Food and Cake Decorating 4-H Projects exhibits will be auctioned during the Food Auction, following the Fashion Revue and Awards Program. Consignment of the exhibit is optional and encouraged, but not required. Three percent (3%) of the sale price will go to the Kiowa County Memorial Scholarship Fund and the remainder to the member. In order to receive a check for Food Auction items. Each exhibitor is required to complete a "Thank You" card for the Purchaser. Thank you cards must be dropped off to the Extension Office in a STAMPED envelope. The Extension office will address and mail. You will have until, October 2, 2020 to **PICK UP and CASH your check from the Extension Office. Any checks not picked up and cashed by then will be considered void and the balance of the check will go to the Scholarship Fund.**
- All exhibits qualifying for Colorado State Fair (first place or Champion) should be in the Kiowa County Extension Office by, Friday, August 14, 2020 by 2:00 p.m.
- Record books may be written in pencil or ink, or typed by typewriter or computer. Your choice will NOT affect judging. Content is the consideration of the judging.

4-H & FFA EXHIBITS

4-H & FFA LIVESTOCK RULES

1. Every project animal exhibited must be designated at the beginning either as a 4-H animal or FFA animal, and cannot be both. 4-H members **must** be enrolled in their project by 4-H deadlines to exhibit that project at Fair.
2. Individual exhibitors or animals may be disqualified by the superintendents for infraction of rules set forth below, including livestock sale rules. Superintendents may bring issues to the Livestock Committee for final determination.
3. 4-H & FFA members will be entered in the Fair using a Fair Entry Form. All livestock animal entries must be turned in by August 7, 2020, along with a \$25.00 per pen deposit. A Bill of Sale for purchased livestock must also be turned in at this time.
4. **All Livestock Entry Forms must be turned in to the Extension office by August 7, 2020 at 4:00 p.m.**
5. Only Kiowa County 4-H and FFA members will be allowed to show in youth classes. This applies when showing your animals or showing for others. Members must show their own animals, unless they have 2 or more in the class, or other reasons approved by the Superintendent.
6. 4-H and FFA members who enroll in Market Animal projects must attend a Meat Quality Assurance (MQA) training (based on requirements set by Colorado State 4-H), and turn in signed MQA form according to requirements set by the Extension Agent and FFA Teacher in order to be eligible for the Kiowa County Fair and Livestock Sale.
7. 4-H and FFA projects are family activities. Parents and other family members should offer advice and encouragement to the member, but try to limit their assistance depending on age, experience, and ability of the member. All adults other than parents and siblings are **prohibited** from fitting, caring for, and handling Jr. Livestock exhibits.
8. Stalls must be cleaned and manure properly disposed of by 8:00 a.m. each day; failure to do so will result in a \$30/day charge to the exhibitor.
9. In order to receive a check for animals sold in the Livestock Sale, each exhibitor is required to complete a Thank You card according to the instructions from the Extension office or the FFA teacher.
All livestock checks that are not cashed within 6 months of issue date will be considered void.
10. The Kiowa County Fair supports and endorses the USDA Wholesome Meat Act, and requires that all exhibitors and their sale animals are in compliance.
Rules pertaining to the USDA Wholesome Meat Act Are:
A. Exhibitors of all Market Animal entries must certify their compliances with manufacture's pre-market withdrawal periods specified for any and all medications, drugs, pesticides, or feed additives administered. The use of any non-approved chemical or improper use of the approved chemicals is strictly prohibited. Certification will be required upon arrival or weigh-in at show.

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B. The following are examples of drug misuse and are strictly prohibited, among others.

*The use of injectable steroid substances to enhance muscle development in the animal.

*The use of various back pour materials.

*The use of tranquilizers and/or anesthetics as a means of calming animals at shows.

C. Any antibiotic, medication, pesticide, or another substance administered to and Market Animal on the fairgrounds will be administered by or under the direct supervision of a licensed veterinarian, or their designated representative. Such medication or treatment may require additional withdrawal time and disqualify the entry from eligibility for sale or shipment to slaughter from the Kiowa County Fair.

D. The Fair Management reserves the right to screen or test any market animal for drug residues of any nature and take any action deemed appropriate if testing results show positive.

E. Colorado also has a "Tampering and Drugging of Livestock" statute. This statute, 18-9-207, appears in the Colorado Revised Statute Criminal Code and makes animal tampering a Class 1 Misdemeanor.

11. The judges' decisions are final. Any interference with judging, arguments, or criticism of judges' decision either by parents, 4-H, or FFA members will result in disqualification and forfeiture of any awards or premiums.
12. Showmanship and ADG classes will be awarded 1st through 5th place awards. All other livestock classes will be awarded 1st through 3rd. Classes will be placed to the bottom for the sale bill order.
13. Eads Shopping Bucks will be awarded as ribbon premiums. They will be given out after 4:00 p.m. on Saturday along with all 4-H and Open Class premiums. They can be picked up at the Community Building from the Kiowa County Fair Board Open Class Liaison. Premiums will be held for pick up in the Extension office for 60 days only and will be forfeited after that time.
14. Any protests dealing with the Kiowa County Fair must be submitted in writing, signed, and filed with Fair management within 24 hours of the incident. A committee of 3 qualified persons will be appointed to review the protest and render a decision. The committee decision will be final. **Protests must include an address and telephone number, along with a \$150.00 protest fee per complaint.**
15. All livestock including rabbits and poultry will be subject to a health inspection by a certified veterinarian. Animals showing evidence of disease or parasites may be refused entry by the superintendents. Exhibitors will be required to remove them from the fairgrounds.
16. Exhibitors will be limited to exhibiting and showing a maximum of 4 head per species, and must be designated at beginning weigh-in. Any animal exceeding the four designated will be charged \$5 per head. Only animals that are entered may be housed at the fair or considered for sale on floor plan.
17. Livestock exhibitors may use adhesives or foams that are labeled "for animal use only". No altering or color will be allowed. Any entry that shows evidence of artificial color will be disqualified. This does not apply to hoof dressing on hooves. Any entry adding any hair-like substance will be disqualified.
18. Lambs & goats may use meshed or plastic muzzles. Muzzles must allow the animal to drink.

19. Livestock exhibitors must put up a stall card for each animal or pen at the time of entry and maintain cards in place until livestock is released. Add sale information following the sale. Also, put up Champion signs immediately following selection and return to livestock office when stalls are cleaned.
 20. All Market sheep, swine, and meat goat entries must be marked and recorded under individual member's name at least 100 days prior to entry day of the fair. All Market steer entries must be marked and recorded under individual member's name at least 200 days prior to entry day of the fair. Participation in the respective project weigh-days for ADG contest will establish eligibility. No late weighing considered except in proven hardship case, taken to the Livestock Show Committee and approved.
 21. Breeding animals and horses must have been owned and/or managed by the exhibitor for at least 90 days.
 22. **Maximum beginning weight for all livestock:**
 Sheep: 90 lbs. (0.25 pound/day required)
 Goats: 70lbs. (0.2 pound/day required)
 Steers: 900 lbs. (1.5 pound/day required)
 Swine: 300 lbs. (1.6 pound/day required)
 23. Requirements for eligibility in the Average Daily Gain:
 - Steers: must be weighed at the special weigh-day approximately 200 days before the fair. To be eligible for ADG steers must not weigh over 750 lbs.
 - Swine: Members wanting to participate will contact the Extension office 2 weeks before Sheep and Goat weigh-in to enter and schedule a date and time for weighing swine. Swine must not weigh over 75 lbs. They will be weighed only the week following small animal weigh-in. The Extension Agent, with help from the Show Committee will travel to your location for weigh in, with the use of a NON-certified scale. The cut off day for weighing ADG will be the Friday at noon after Small Animal weigh-in. That Friday will begin the count on days for feed for Swine ADG. Swine that are selected for ADG contest that weigh over 300 lbs. can only be sold at the 300 lbs. mark. (thus if the pig weighs 310 lbs., it will be sold at 300 lbs.)
 - Individual ADG entries must be designated at the weigh-ins. Only one entry may be made per exhibitor in each ADG contest.
 - Average Daily Gain contest animals must be shown in the market class.
 - If any animal is weighed in late under hardship rule, gain will be divided by the same number of days established for regular weigh-day. Animals weighed early will have gain divided by the actual number of days. Hardship rule is by discretion of the Junior Livestock Committee.
 24. Sheep must be slick shorn and without blankets when weighed-in at the Fair. Pigs must be free of mud and have clean ear tag.
 25. There will be no re-weighing of animals at any weigh-in event.
 26. Cattle must remain barn, show ring, wash rack, or adjoining area visible from the barn for fitting, exercising, etc. Hogs, sheep, and goats must remain in barn, show ring, or wash rack. This rule will be applied at the fairgrounds beginning 24 hours prior to the deadline for animals to be in place at the fair, and also at the fairgrounds on performance day.
 27. Exhibitors with animals they are unable to control may be asked to leave the show ring. Any animal that is unmanageable may be disqualified by the superintendent, and they may be ineligible for show and sale. Safety of the exhibitors and spectators must be considered.
 28. Showmanship contestants must show only their own animal.
 29. Showmanship classes will be held first in show order. Exhibitors must show in the showmanship class to be eligible for other classes or sale. Exceptions may be made by superintendent and Extension staff with advance request by exhibitor and parent for those who are away at college or have other valid reason for not being able to show.
 30. Winners of showmanship classes must decide immediately after the class if the way to participate in Round Robin showmanship in that division. If not, contact the 3rd place contestant and superintendent. A showmanship winner may compete in other species showmanship.
 31. Animals to be taken home by exhibitor are released at 4:00 p.m. Saturday, and should be removed Saturday evening.

The sale will be clerked by Burlington Livestock Exchange and Dennie and Charlene Flock.

Rules:

1. All sale animals must be shown in the appropriate class.
2. **Each Exhibitor is limited to a total of 3 animals to be sold in the Junior Livestock Sale, but NOT more than 1 per species, whether enrolled in 4-H or FFA or both.**
3. **BEEF**– Market steers must weigh between 1100 and 1500 lbs. and must have achieved an average daily gain of 1.5 lbs. per day since Winter weigh-in to be eligible for sale. Average Daily Gain contest animals may weigh over 1500 lbs. and still be eligible for sale.
4. **Sheep**– Market sheep must weigh at least 110 lbs. There is no maximum weight on sheep. Sheep must achieve an average daily gain of 0.25 lbs. per day since the Spring weigh-in to be eligible for sale. Animals that weigh over 170 lbs. can only be sold at the 170 lbs. mark. (thus if a sheep weighs 187 lbs., it will be sold as if it weighs 170 lbs.)
5. **Meat Goats**– Market goats must weigh between 50 and 120 lbs. and have achieved an average daily gain of 0.2 lbs. per day since Spring weigh-in to be eligible for sale. Goats that weigh over 120 lbs. can only be sold as if it weighs 120 lbs. (thus if a goat weighs 130 lbs., it will be sold as if it weighs 120 lbs.)
6. **Swine**– Market swine must weigh between 220 and 300 lbs. and have achieved an average daily gain of 1.6 lbs. per day since Spring weigh-in to be eligible for sale. Pigs that weigh over 300 lbs. can only be sold as if it weighs 300 lbs. (thus if a pig weighs over 310 lbs., it will be sold as if it weighs 300 lbs.)
7. **Poultry**– Each exhibitor may sell a meat pen (1 turkey, or 3 broiler pullets or rooster). A pen counts as one “animal”.
8. **Rabbits**– Each exhibitor may sell a meat pen (3 rabbits or baker rabbit). A pen counts as one “animal”.
9. All Grand Champion Market animals are required to sell. This Does not apply to Reserve Grand Champion.
10. **Sale order:** Grand Champion, Reserve Champion, Average Daily Gain Champions, First places, Second places, Third places, random by species. **On even number years, the order will be; Market Beef, Sheep, Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, and last Swine. On odd number years, the order will be; Market Beef, Swine, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, and last Goats.** Any donation animals will sell at the end of the sale. Any consignment donated back, by the buyer for resale, will be considered donated to Kiowa County Junior Livestock, Kiowa County 4-H Council, or Eads FFA and will be resold. A consignment specifically donated back to the member may be taken home, but may NOT be resold.
11. Sale weight will be weigh-in weight at fair.
12. Each beef, sheep, goat, and pig must be designated for sale, floor plan, or take home immediately after their respective show is complete. Individual animal cards will be on file at the fair office. It will be the responsibility of the **EXHIBITOR AND PARENT** to complete the card. **If no card is completed and turned into the fair office for the animal, the member retains ownership and must take the animal home after the fair. This also means the member will NOT be able to sale the animal, if the card is not completed and turned in.** Arrangements for animals to go to the locker plants MUST be made by the exhibitor or buyer. Fair Management is not responsible for arrangements and will NOT transport animals. **Any changes must be done through the fair office by noon on Friday.** Animals that are below or above weight limits for the species are NOT guaranteed a place on the floor plan. It is the discretion of the floor plan buyer. All animals that are over the maximum weight will be sold on the floor plan ONLY at the maximum weight.
13. Bill or sale Brand Certification on the Market Steers must be turned in no later than weigh-in the first day of fair or they will not be eligible for sale.
14. Any animals showing evidence of sickness or injury which may affect acceptability of the carcass may be declared ineligible by the superintendent or veterinarian, and are subject to inspection at any time during the show.
15. Five percent (5%) commission will be deducted from the sellers check to cover sale expenses and other expenses related to animal market projects.
16. In order to receive a check for the livestock sale, each exhibitor is required to complete a “Thank You” card according to the instructions from the Extension office or FFA Teacher. **All livestock checks that are not cashed within 6 months of issue date will be considered void.**
17. The was racks will be closed starting 30 mins before the sale in order to avoid congestion in that area.
18. Sale animals must be fitted for sale in the same manner as for the show ring.
19. The sale will be considered terminal for the project, and no sale can be reclaimed by the exhibitor for any reason. Every animal that goes through the sale must be floor planned or purchased by the premium sale buyer.
20. **There is a \$50.00 one-time fee if you do not personally sell your own animal. Also, you must nominate a person to sale your animal at least one week in advance of sale to the Junior Livestock Committee for approval.**
